Rotarix (RVI)		Oral vaccine recommended to prevent gastroenteritis caused by a rotavirus infection in young children. Can start after 6 weeks of age and must be completed by 24 weeks of age.		
Pediacel (DTaP-IPV-Hib)		Diphtheria, pertussis, polio, tetanus, Hib		
MMR		Measles, mumps, rubella (German measles). First dose given on or after 1st birthday.		
Priorix-Tetra (MMRV)		Measles, mumps, rubella (German measles) and varicella		
Adacel®Polio (Tdap-IPV)		Diphtheria, pertussis, polio, tetanus		
Adacel (Tdap)		Diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus		
Menjugate (Meningococcal C)		One dose if >1 year. Children immunized in infancy (i.e. <1 year of age) require another dose at least one year after the last dose for enhanced protection.		
Prevnar®I3 (Pneu-C-I3)		A three dose schedule for healthy (low risk) children - 2 primary doses at 2 and 4 months of age and a booster dose at 12 months. See Prevnar®13 Eligibility Schedule (tables 13&19) for high risk children.		

According to the ISPA (immunization of schools pupils act) all vaccines are required with the exception of Prevnar, Rotarix, HPV and Hepatitis B.
